From time to time, usually due to illness or in-service training, it is necessary to employ supply-teaching staff. The school tries to ensure that temporary staff are those who know the children and the school routine.

The School Day:

8:30	Gates open, main playground is open and staffed

Our bottom playground is staffed from 8:30am, to allow parents to drop their children off. Children should be dropped off at the main gate and walk to the main playground themselves, where they will be supervised by members of our support staff team.

At afternoon break, the children in Early Years, Year 1 and 2 have a healthy snack provided by the school. We ask that parents send a healthy snack for these year groups for morning break. All other classes have a time to eat their healthy snack, if one is sent, either just before, or just after break time.

The School Council & Well-being Ambassadors:

The School Council is a new idea to Stoberry Park this year. Two representatives for each class are voted for by their peers and take part in half-termly meetings. This opportunity is open to all children, from Early Years, all the way through to Year 6.

The children were fundamental in designing our new School Values this year; they asked their classes what they felt a Stoberry pupil should be like and which values they should uphold. Following sharing the children's ideas, the council then voted on which values they felt were most important. They also gather suggestions and ideas from their classes each half term, which we discuss over biscuits!

Our wellbeing ambassadors are known to the children and have received training in their role, allowing them to support children with worries and concerns – a vital role for the wellbeing of our children.

A Creative & Irresistible Curriculum:

Our Curriculum

At Stoberry Park, it is our intent for your children exciting and vibrant curriculum that will support become independent, resilient, well rounded have the skills necessary to become successful capable of taking opportunities beyond their environment. We do this by ensuring that we

deliver a rich

and diverse curriculum that goes beyond the requirements of the national curriculum. We have three core values that are at the centre of the curriculum: academic excellence, character education and learning to learn (metacognition) and our curriculum is designed to reflect a wide range of learning experiences.

As a large school with predominantly mixed age classes, we organise the curriculum on a rolling programme basis so children encounter different areas of learning throughout their time with us. We structure and sequence our curriculum to ensure that pupils can build on prior learning which helps them to develop long term memory. Subject experiences are planned across the year and phase in order to allow concepts to be reinforced and remembered. The skills and knowledge that need to be taught are broken down into small, progressive steps and are used to inform teachers' planning.

Academic Excellence is fundamental within our curriculum model. The children's acquisition of a deep body of knowledge within subject disciplines, will enable them to express their learning to the highest standard. When children achieve excellence, this gives them the confidence to challenge themselves further. Through this process of experiencing success, they will develop character, for example grit, determination, self-efficacy and courage.

Character Education Whilst academic success remains a core priority, developing character is also an essential element of our curriculum model. Our curriculum gives children opportunities to make a positive impact on society. We want them to grasp the possibilities and opportunities of life beyond the classroom, to enable them to thrive at each and every challenge they face in life and make a difference to themselves and those around them.

Metacognition Our curriculum not only focuses on achieving character whilst pursuing



academic excellence, but also emphasises deep learning through developing the skills of metacognition. We use an enquiry approach to drive our learning experiences, making the reflective learning process explicit. In addition to this, tools for thinking will be taught to support children's higher order thinking, synthesis of knowledge and creating of new thinking.

Special Educational Needs and Disabilities:

We are a fully inclusive school and pride ourselves on our efforts to meet the needs of all learners. Children with Special Educational Needs and Disabilities are included as part of the class and involved in all aspects of the curriculum. Detailed planning and personalised targets are in place to help to ensure high quality progress and meetings are held regularly with parents to inform them of their child's achievements.

School Uniform:

Our school uniform is supplied by South West Schoolwear in Wells and is available to view on their website here. Children are welcome to wear the uniform as detailed on this website, or a plain purple sweatshirt or cardigan. Trousers and skirts should be black or dark grey. Shoes should be plain and dark in colour; they should not have logos that are visible.

School Dinners:

At present, we provide Universal Infant Free School Meals (UIFSM), as funded by the Government and supplied by The Fabulous Lunch Company, based in Westbury Sub Mendip. This is available for all children in Early Years, Year 1 and Year 2. Each day there is a choice of three possible meals: a meat main meal; a vegetarian main meal and a jacket potato or salad. Parents can send a packed lunch if they choose. Children make their choices via an online app or website in advance. Once the children are in the juniors, parents can continue to pay for this service if they choose.

Extra-Curricular Activities:

The school provides a rich variety of activities which take place during lunchtimes and after school. Most of these are run voluntarily by members of staff with the help of parents on occasions. We also invite specialist staff, such as sports coaches and scientists in to school to work with the children for extra-curricular activities; some of these are at a cost to parents.

At various times during the year, clubs on offer include; netball, cricket, choir, football, tag rugby, fun-science, athletics, rounders, gymnastics, dance, art & craft, gardening, book club and hockey.

Children are regularly involved in representing the school at tournaments and local events.

Music Tuition:

We encourage all children to learn to play an instrument as part of our curricular music teaching.

Peripatetic music teachers also visit the school regularly to offer tuition in the violin, woodwind, brass, guitar, drums, vocal and the piano. If you have a child with a passion to learn another instrument, please let us know and we will see what we can find! These are optional, paid services that parents can choose to access.

Before and After School Provision:

We are lucky to have a fantastic, dedicated building in which our 'SPARKS' wraparound care operates. This provision is available from 7:30am until 5:30 pm every school day and also offers holiday clubs for selected weeks each year.

The children access a range of activities, including sports, cookery, arts & craft and also have a range of games, puzzles and other activities that they can choose from. See out SPARKS leaflet and information page under the 'Parents' section of the website.

Safeguarding Children:

The school aims to provide a safe and supportive environment for all the children. All staff have undergone child protection procedures and volunteers have to undergo all necessary record checks before helping in the school. The school has a Child Protection Policy which is regularly updated.

The Designated Teacher for Child Protection is the Headteacher and any concerns about a child's welfare are and should be raised at an early stage.

At Stoberry Park School the health, safety and wellbeing of every child is our top priority. We expect all staff, Governors, parent/carers and visitors to share this commitment to safeguarding our pupils.

Accessibility Plan:

Stoberry Park School aims to provide a fully inclusive environment for children, parents and visitors to the site. We continually review access to the school and to the curriculum, in order to meet the needs of all.

The school is regarded as being easily accessible and able to meet the needs of most physically disabled children and visitors.

The school has an Accessibility Plan and a copy is available from the school office, or our website. Should it be necessary, we are able to provide a copy of the Plan in a range of formats. Please do not hesitate to contact us should you have a specific requirement.

Equal Opportunities:

We are an inclusive school committed to a policy of equal opportunities whereby pupils, regardless of gender, race, ability, religion and financial circumstances are encouraged to achieve their full potential.

Complaints:

We make every effort to resolve any concerns or complaints raised by parents. Any complaint should in the first instance, be made to the class teacher or Headteacher. It is hoped that in most cases, complaints can be dealt with at this informal level. If this is not successful, there is an agreed Local Authority Complaints Procedure that will be followed by the school.

Admissions Policy:

Somerset Local Authority (LA) is the initial Admissions Authority for all Community Schools in the county. We follow the Local Authority Admissions Policy for Community Schools, further details of which can be obtained by contacting:

The LA's admission policy is to admit children to school in the academic year that they become five. The school follows this policy but from September 2009, children whose 4th birthday falls between 1st April and 31st August, may defer entry for the autumn term until the spring term.

If a child has a disability they will be treated no less favourably than other children and we make every effort to make reasonable adjustments to accommodate their needs.

Every effort is made to provide a place for your child in our school. However, on occasions we are over subscribed within a year group and your request for a place will be referred to the Local Authority, at the above address, who will provide further advice.

For in-year admissions, we apply our own Admissions Policy, which can be viewed on our school website.

School and the Community:

The school enjoys links with many local organisations including Cubs, Scouts, Rainbows, Brownies, Girl Guides, Sea Scouts, local residential homes, the Police, the City Council, local shops and many charitable organisations including Save the Children, Comic Relief and Children in Need. Although the school is not a church school, it has good relationships with the churches in our catchment and city.

We also have links with several local industries and businesses and are keen to consider any schemes, such as sponsorship, which may enhance the children's education or support the school.


